# Farm Improvement Projects Two down, one under way, and one (big one) to go...

<u>FENCING:</u> Beginning Sept. 9th all pasture fences are scheduled to be replaced and some pastures reconfigured. Say good-by to the wire fences. The new fences will be in wood or coated (electrified) wire -- better for the safety of our horses. The job, to be done by a professional fencing crew from Lancaster PA, is projected to take about two weeks. Our turn-out schedule may be affected during that time but we will try to get all horses out regularly while it is underway.

FLOOD DRAINAGE: Excavation of the drainage area behind the barn has been completed. The area was completely dug up and the pipes were cleared and replaced as necessary. We expect that we will fare well with heavy rainfall in the future.

FOOTING IN UPPER AREN: The ring was excavated with a Box Scraper to restore it to its original condition. Now, with daily raking, we should be able to keep it in excellent riding condition.

FENCE PAINTING: Slowly but Surely the fences are getting painted - Thanks (mostly) to Laura and Sara.
