Girl Scouts Horsemanship Badge Clinic

Bring your Girl Scout troop to Saddle valley to earn their horsemanship badges. The clinic runs about two hours. We begin in the (heated) club-room where we go over barn rules and discuss some of the agenda topics. Some troops have brought after-school snacks for the girls to eat/drink during this period. The rest of the time is spent in the barn with our horses – and learning about tack, feeding, grooming etc. Everyone has first a hand experience with our horses – grooming, leading etc. The cost is \$10 - \$15 per scout depending on the number that come. Two troops can come together to lower the cost.
