SVF horses can’t wait to get back to the barn for their grain these days. We’ve up-graded our feed program to Pennfield Signature 10 (10% Protein, 10% fat, and 10% fiber) – which is specially formulated for horses in our region (where the soil lacks selenium and vitamin E). This feed is also designed to minimize colic and ulcers. Even though it ‘s good for them - the horses are loving it!
